- The goal in creating the Assessment Literacy Standards was to define what those affected by student assessment (of all types and for all purposes) should believe, know, and do regarding assessment
- After defining these, it is the goal of the MAC (and an essential part of its mission) to help various users become more assessment literate
- Becoming assessment literate is important, for a variety of reasons

2015 Work on the Assessment Literacy Standards

- Refine the ALS document
- Develop a plan to catalog and create resources to develop assessment literacy among students, teachers, administrators, and policymakers
- Seek funding for a small grant to fund the development of a larger grant on assessment literacy development
- Create assessment literacy self-assessments
 - Start with building administrators

Assessment Literacy Self-Assessments

- The goal of these assessments is to assist students, teachers, administrators, and perhaps policymakers to gauge their own levels of assessment literacy
- The hope is that this will serve to inform these individuals about how assessment affects them and others
- An additional hope is that low assessment literacy self-assessment scores will encourage the individuals to become more assessment literate

Assessment Literacy Self-Assessments

- There are a number of standards for building administrators in the MAC ALS document for building administrators
- We need your help to prioritize them
- There are four contexts for your priority ratings
 - Large-scale assessment
 - **▼** Summative, annual assessments
 - ➤ Interim benchmark assessments (short-cycle summative assessments
 - Classroom assessment
 - **▼** Summative assessments
 - Formative-assessment strategies

Assessment Literacy Self-Assessments

- In each row in each column, rate the importance for the work of a building administrator to believe, know, or do what the standard describes:
 - 4 = Essential
 - 3 = Important
 - 2 = Somewhat Important
 - 1 = Not Important
